Be Bold:Demonstrate our Impact




This year we sadly marked the passing of Margaret



Between April 2022 and March 2023, you supported more than 600 programs ending genderbased violence, building economic stability and opportunities, and empowering participants with confidence and leadership skills.

These grassroots programs know how to meet needs of women, girls, and gender-diverse people in our current context of challenge and change. Your support also enabled our grantee partners to collaborate across regions, strategize, and advocate for nation-wide systemic change.

Your steadfast commitment gets us to the next level - a gender-equal society that benefits everyone.

ENDING VIOLENCE

Together, we can break the cycle of violence - now and for future generations. You support programs that help survivors move out of violence by offering services they need to rebuild their lives - emergency shelter, sexual assault crisis support, child witness to violence programs - as well as programs that prevent violence.

- Teen Healthy Relationship programs enable young people of all genders to learn about dating violence, sexual assault, and how to build safe, healthy, and equal relationships.
- Rebuilding Lives programs help survivors find safe housing, sexual violence support, counselling, and legal support, as well as help children heal from witnessing violence.

Program Spotlight: Huron Women's Shelter, Goderich, Ontario

The shelter provides housing and counselling services to women and girls who have experienced violence and supports their holistic healing, self-discovery, and leadership development.

"The shelter supported and advocated for me as I continued to navigate safety threats from my ex-partner, including stalking and financial abuse. I was in a position where I didn't have access to my funds, so the shelter provided access to funding that allowed me to relocate. I was able to really have my life back. ... I will not forget the support I received from Huron Women's Shelter as long as I live."

Program Spotlight: Community Connections (Revelstoke) Society, British Columbia

With the help of funding delivered by the Canadian Women's Foundation, Revelstoke Community Connections opened a dedicated drop-in Women's Centre in early 2023. Advocates in this remote community knew it needed this centre for about 10 years, based on rising demand for services related to gender-based violence. Since launching, the Centre has been able to reduce wait times for support, and works with other organizations to help women and genderdiverse people access the services they need. People can drop in to talk to staff members about abuse issues they're dealing with in a safe space with kitchen, laundry, and computer facilities. They can also access a closet stocked with clothing and other supplies.

"When people come in or learn about the Centre, the reaction is 'This is what we've always needed."



Program Spotlight: Expanding the Reach: To Address Violence Against Women With Disabilities, Scarborough Women's Centre, Ontario

Women living with disabilities face a disproportionately high risk of gender-based violence. This program helps to strengthen participants' ability to recognize signs of abuse, develop healthy relationships, and builds a sense of community among participants.

"We have heard participants say, 'I wish I had this knowledge when I was younger. I may have made different relationship decisions, if I did.' Women with disabilities historically have not had much access to learning about creating healthy relationships. This program helps people develop the skills to identify what they actually want in relationships and reminds them that they are not alone or at fault for the barriers they face."

Program Spotlight: Young Warriors, Victoria Native Friendship Centre, British Columbia

This program is for Indigenous youth who have witnessed violence. It helps young people create a positive self-image, set boundaries, and learn violence prevention strategies, and it ends in a coming-of-age cultural ceremony with community Elders. It uses land-based learning and storytelling so essential for Indigenous youth.

"I like how I can be who I am when I'm here, and I have people to talk to. It makes me less lonely."

Program Spotlight: Positive Adolescent Sexuality Support (PASS) program, Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Centre, Headingly, Manitoba

PASS fosters healthy relationships and sexuality in a culturally relevant, safe, and supportive learning environment for Indigenous young people. Workshops are youth-driven and cover topics like dating violence, sexual health, and self-esteem.

"We learned, cried, and laughed together. I love coming to the round room. We smudge, we support one another, and we have good food while we learn about important youth issues."

ECONOMIC SECURITY AND EMPOWERMENT

Together, we are supporting diverse women's journeys toward financial stability, breaking down barriers to workforce entry and advancement. The programs you help fund reduce risks of poverty and economic instability and:

- ▶ Offer wrap-around support to maximize participants' ability to succeed
- ► Enable participants to access lucrative sectors including technology, construction, carpentry, and other skilled trades
- ▶ Empower participants to launch and strengthen their own businesses
- ▶ Offer work experience opportunities in social purpose enterprises run by non-profit organizations

Program Spotlight:

TechWomen, Immigrant Services Society of BC, Vancouver, British Columbia

TechWomen prepares newcomer women for technology careers through skills training, practicum experience, mentoring, and career counselling.

"When I moved here, I realized it would not be easy to find work in my field ... I found ISSofBC ... They provided career advice and told me about the TechWomen program ... This aligned exactly with what I was looking for and they also provided childcare support for my son, which made it so much easier to participate in the program. After completing the program, I got an opportunity to join an immersive bootcamp in one of the technical schools, and I completed my diploma in web development. ... I found a way to fulfill my dreams in my new home in Canada."

Program Spotlight: Immigrant Women and Newcomers Exploring Business Program, SEED Winnipeg, Manitoba

This program provides business development support for Indigenous and newcomer women to help them launch a new business or expand an existing one.

"I gained valuable business skills needed to succeed in Canada. I also obtained my Manitoba Food Handling Certificate and am currently pursuing my Cook Red Seal Certification as a Chef. In June 2020, my business partner and I started our business, Nyumbani African Delicacies. ... Cooking is my passion, and I love seeing people happy while having a meal and enjoying it to the last bite."

Program Spotlight: CNC Industrial Mechanic Millwright Pre-Apprenticeship Certificate Program, Women's Enterprise Skills Training of Windsor, Ontario

This program helps participants enter millwright/machining trades. It includes a placement, training in communication skills and computer literacy, and wrap-around support to reduce barriers to success.

"The first time picking up the welding torch was absolutely incredible. I felt like I could make or do anything. Before finishing school, I lined up three job offers, all to start work immediately after I graduated ... I feel strong and capable."

INVESTMENT READINESS PROGRAM

Through the Investment Readiness Program, we support Social Purpose Organizations (SPOs) – charities, non-profits, social enterprises, for-profits with a social purpose, and co-operatives – led by and serving diverse women and Two Spirit, trans, and non-binary people. SPOs advance social, cultural, or environmental objectives while generating revenues that can be reinvested into their work in communities across the country. This model can help gender justice and equity-advancing organizations fund and boost the change they create. Since 2019, 90 social purpose organizations have received funding through this program – 80 per cent of which are led by the communities they serve.









Program Spotlight:

The Abundance Store, Elizabeth Fry Society Mainland Nova Scotia, and ElevateHER, Dartmouth, Nova Scotia

The Abundance Store employs women and gender-diverse people who have been criminalized, giving them an opportunity to gain professional experience and learn new employment skills. They also sell items they create in the store, and profits go back into the program.

"The women we work with have been through some of the most intense traumas that I have ever seen, and the majority have never had a job before. But through their work at the store, we see their skills, empowerment, and confidence grow.

One of our original employees has since transitioned into meaningful employment as an Indigenous peer support worker, which feeds her soul, and she's doing amazingly well in her position. Being able to offer this program has been a game-changer in terms of reintegration and recovery."

BOOSTING CONFIDENCE

Girls and non-binary youth deserve to feel confident, resilient, and have every opportunity to become tomorrow's leaders. You are helping them get there.

Thanks to your support, the Girls' Fund enables programs for young people at a critical time in their lives when confidence tends to drop. Participants build self-esteem, a sense of belonging, and leadership skills through activities including:

- ► STEM education
- Sports and physical activity
- Media literacy
- ► Indigenous culture and connection
- Mentorship and leadership



Program Spotlight: Le Centre filles mobile (Mobile Girls' Centre), YWCA Québec, Quebec

The Mobile Girls' Centre enables participants to develop leadership skills and empowers them to take action. The project is for and by the participants, so each group collaboratively decides on goals, projects, and themes.

"I really have more self-confidence since I started participating in the girls' committee. I have felt supported."

Program spotlight: Girl Force and Girl Power, Women's Centre of Calgary, Alberta

These after-school and summer camp programs create spaces for girls to build a sense of community, explore issues in their lives, foster community activism, and grow leadership skills.

"It was amazing to see how participants felt safe to talk openly about their mental health struggles. The group requested more sessions ... to talk about challenges around bullying, online harassment, relationships with parents, and more."

Program Spotlight: Girl Code, ElevateHER, East Mountain, Nova Scotia

This program offers a supportive and confidence-building environment, where girls and gender-diverse participants come together. Participants develop their potential, independence, and identity as they build healthy relationships with older mentors.

"My daughter always struggled to fit in and because of this she really struggled with self-esteem, anxiety, and building relationships both in and out of school. School was a major source of anxiety for her. Girl Code has been the only program that she is excited to attend. Not only that, but she has learned so many skills that have made going to school much easier for her. She has friends at school now, handles conflict like a champ and radiates confidence."

Opening doors for diverse entrepreneurs

Women, trans, and non-binary entrepreneurs face multiple barriers to starting and scaling new businesses. Through our exciting new Partnering for Feminist Entrepreneurship Project, we are working with seven organizations to provide education, training, mentorship, and networking opportunities to diverse founders, as well as address systemic barriers they face. We will also collaborate on raising awareness about these challenges and highlight the need for intersectional feminist business and financing practices.

Supporting trans and gender-diverse communities

How can we support trans and gender-diverse communities to thrive? This is the key question of the Transcend Impact Challenge, led by the Sonor Foundation, set up and launched with support from the Canadian Women's Foundation and other partners. The Challenge will channel a \$1.5 million fund toward projects that foster supportive environments, economic and financial stability, housing, education, and healthcare access for trans communities.

Landsberg Award to lift leaders in feminist journalism

Journalism plays a critical role in uncovering gender gaps and sparking systemic change. This year's Landsberg Award, co-presented by the Canadian Women's Foundation and the Canadian Journalism Foundation, went to journalists Molly Hayes, Tavia Grant, and Elizabeth Renzetti for their work on a Globe and Mail series on intimate partner violence, which spotlighted coercive control.

Program Spotlight: Stardale Women's Group, Calgary, Alberta

Through this organization dedicated to empowering Indigenous girls and young women, girls are working with a filmmaker to create a unique documentary about reclaiming traditional Indigenous women's leadership roles and rituals. The documentary is scheduled for release in fall 2023, but you can see some of the girls' work in the trailer, "Warrior Women."

Program Spotlight: RISE Empowerment Program, Community Resource Centre, Killaloe, Ontario

This program offers rural girls and trans and non-binary youth opportunities to connect, express themselves creatively, learn their rights, and build healthy habits and leadership skills. After they finish the program, former participants get an opportunity to be hired on as part of the staff team.

"The safe space this program provides is important as it allows youth to build leadership skills and confidence in a supportive and inclusive environment that may not be available to them elsewhere. As a participant in RISE, I loved the sense of community the group had and how it aided me in developing strong leadership skills. As a staff member at RISE I got to see the sense of community grow, along with the participants' friendships and confidence."

Grantmaking for Gender Justice in the North

The Canadian Women's Foundation is honoured to partner with MakeWay Foundation on a Northern Strategy, guided by the Northern Women and Girls Advisory Committee with representatives from Yukon, Northwest Territories, Nunavut, Nunavik, and Nunatsiavut.

In recent months, the Foundation and Makeway have embarked on a learning tour across the North, with gatherings happening in Whitehorse, Dawson City, Yellowknife, Inuvik, Aklavik, Tuktoyaktuk, Iqaluit, Pond Inlet, Nain, and Goose Bay. These gatherings offer the opportunity to get a better understanding of each community, and include focus groups on how to tailor funding to their unique priorities and needs.

Recently funded initiatives include:

➤ The Arctic Rose Foundation's Messy Book Program, which provides culturally specific expressive arts programming to young people in grades 5 to 12, including sessions with guest Inuit and Indigenous artists. High school students are trained to become liaisons and mentors to run these after-school programs in Arctic Bay, Igloolik, and Sanikiluaq.

"The program is designed, led, and facilitated by Inuit, who use a variety of artistic mediums as forms of expression and healing. It's so rewarding to see Inuit youth gain confidence in their innate knowledge and skills as they create these spaces for children to see themselves reflected positively."

► The Northern Birthwork Collective offers Indigenous doula training to increase doula capacity in the region, revitalize traditional birth practices, and ultimately increase access to holistic, culturally-sensitive birthing services.

"The Northern Birthwork Collective provided incredible support when we were required to travel for the birth of our first child. ... Having a doula to support us during a difficult and unexpected birth made all the difference for our new family."

- ► The Akpaliapik Program of Ilitaqsiniq helps girls age 9 to 13 in Rankin Inlet gain culturally-grounded life skills and mentorship opportunities.
- The Victor Sammurtok School in Chesterfield Inlet, Nunavut strengthens students' cultural identity, resilience, and academic engagement through the practice of Inuit games. Traditional games including the knuckle hop, airplane planking, and foot racing help develop strength, agility, and endurance needed for survival skills like hunting.

Girls in the Akpaliapik Program build confidence and cultural connection through a variety of activities, including making mikku (dried caribou, above) and outdoor activities (below).

Why do we need a Feminist Creator Prize?

- Cybercrimes in Canada have been rising since 2018 - the Internet is facilitating hate crimes in increasing proportions.
- 90% of women respondents to the 2020
 Toxic Hush survey said they've experienced or witnessed increased online abuse since the pandemic began.
- The Coalition for Women in Journalism reports that Canada is the country where the greatest number of women journalists were exposed to organized troll campaigns in 2022.
- When women report tech-facilitated violence, they're often told to stop posting. This effectively silences them and enables the problem to persist.

We need to counter growing hate and harassment and take action to bolster diverse feminist voices before they're silenced forever. In this time of uncertainty and polarization, we're moved by renewed calls for justice, equity, and a better future, powerfully led by underheard communities and the next generation.

SHOCKPROOFING COMMUNITIES AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE: A NATIONAL SUMMIT

In times of crisis, gender-based violence like intimate partner abuse and sexual assault spikes. We saw this during the pandemic, and we will see it in future health, environmental, or economic crises - unless we take action now.

The Shockproofing Communities Summit was grounded in the knowledge that violence spikes are not inevitable, and we must:


- Safeguard our communities from future shocks
- Reinforce overstretched gender-based violence services all over Canada

With Women's Shelters Canada in March 2023, we brought together hundreds of diverse gender-based violence experts in Ottawa from across Canada to strategize violence prevention in times of disaster and crisis.

We shared critical resources and recommendations including:

- A <u>toolkit</u> for service providers of 2SLGBTQIA+ communities, which face a particularly high risk of gender-based violence.
- ► The first-of-its-kind emergency preparedness toolkit for gender justice organizations, produced in collaboration with disaster and emergency management experts and antiviolence practitioners.
- A <u>report</u> that maps out what we need to provide life-saving gender-based violence services in both normal and emergency circumstances.





What delegates said:

- "Passion for gender-based violence work can be compared to a fire. If we pay attention to it, it ignites change. If we aren't paying attention, the fire goes out or it can get out of control, and we get burned."
- "Although we are all from different organizations, we all share that our work is tough, underpaid, undervalued. There is a gender issue - most of us are women providing these kinds of services."
- "When you feel you're out on the perimeter, hearing others in the room has really helped reassure me that sometimes we've been on the right path and that this is a common experience."
- "We work by, for and with women. And I realized how strong this sector is, but also fragile, in times of crisis. And the people we count on are front-line workers ... We need to properly fund this sector because it is vital."
- "We came from Saskatoon ... hearing all the powerful speeches from all the women from all over, it's so powerful to be able to bring this back to my community."

I could tell by the look on her face that she was surprised to hear that noise and she had that sort of fearful look ... Change came over her right away, and then she made the hand signal.

And so, we all knew and you sort of freeze in that second because you're just not expecting it at all ...

And so we just kept talking and I had her cell phone number, so I texted her and just asked her if she had a safety plan ...

We ended up calling 911 for her because she asked for that in the chat."



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
The Rosemary Brown Giving Collective
