

Niioie:ren earned a Bachelor of Education at McGill University and Certificate in Social Work at Carlton University. She held many positions over her life, but the highlight was teaching Kanien'keha Immersion at Karonhianonhnha School, Kindergarten. She is a Faithkeeper, upholding the tradition and ceremonial life of the Kanien'keha:ka. Niioie:ren's life centers around family and linguistic, historical, cultural, ceremonial, and equity education. She has participated in many gatherings, panels, and conferences in Canada and the USA.

Having arrived in Quebec 10 years ago, she persevered to establish her company, A Les Sens Ciel, in 2019 as a pastry and catering service, with the support of Sphère Québec and Microcredit Montreal. With her macarons and pastries, A Les Sens Ciel loves to take curious people on a sensory journey through dishes adapted to dietary restrictions. The success of her company is built on the quality of ingredients from small local producers, craftsmanship, mastery of skills, and the respect and attentiveness shown to her clients.



Chantel Chapman (she/her), Trauma of Money

Chantel Chapman is a refreshing voice in the financial recovery and education space, renowned for her cutting-edge, relatable, and trauma-informed money guidance. In 2018, Chantel founded The Trauma of Money™, an accredited course certifying professionals in facilitating and healing money trauma. Leveraging 14+ years in mortgage and financial literacy/recovery consulting, Chantel has taught and written finance curricula for numerous universities and non-profit organizations like United Way. She's also a proud member of the National Task Force for Economic Justice, supporting Canadian Center for Women's Empowerment in ending financial abuse.



Félicité Donyo (she/her), TUKUAN

Designer and stylist by training, Félicité Donyo has worked for large companies and local designers, gaining over 20 years of experience and expertise in product development. After observing both good and bad practices in overseas production, she reflected on the impact of short supply chains in garment manufacturing. Following her meeting with future business partner Lisa Noto, she was captivated by the opportunity to offer a local product that meets all the criteria for more eco-friendly fashion and incorporates the circular economy. As an entrepreneur, she has also added a training in responsible management to her creative skills, enabling her to make TUKUAN an ethical and eco-responsible company.



Indu Krishnamurthy (she/her), Microcredit Montreal

Driven by a commitment to social impact, Indu Krishnamurthy began her involvement with Microcrédit Montréal in 2008. Now, as the organization's Executive Director, she continues its mission to provide loans and support to those overlooked by traditional financial systems. Jessika Gauvin was raised by a forager and herbalist mother who focused on connection with the land, making remedies with plants and supplementing family meals with wild foods. Jessika is now a wild mushroom specialist with over 7000 hours of field work under her belt. She is President of the Mycological Society of NB (Myco, NB), owner of Enchanted Mushroom Forest foraging company, a member of a team of mycologists assisting poison control with emergency poisoning cases planet wide and a trusted identifier for The North American Mycological Society.





Jillisa Brown, (she/her), House of Nine Sorority

Jillisa Brown is a global leader dedicated to advancing productive systems change. Her passion for developing people and communities launched her journey as a community leader, mentor, and coach. Through her pioneering work in decolonizing systems that exclude equity-seeking communities, she has been instrumental in driving significant changes within Canada's social finance and social innovation ecosystems. Jillisa is the Co-Founder of House of Nine Sorority, a unique space where Black women gather for self-mastery and sisterhood. 
